Areas where we could make improvements

- Institutional website and RDR may have different wordings
 - Redesigned aspects of the website to better match service so we have well rounded info provided
- Consistency in advertised name
 - Contact registries (RE3, Sherpa) to ensure consistent naming of RDR and consistent/updated info in RRID records
- Found ourselves registered in multiple RRIDs, some of which were outdated



Areas where we could make improvements

- Revisiting fields of research
 - Ensure Fields of Research are more consistent and aligned (bound to specific vocabularies)
- More linkage between ARC & Library teams!
 - Regular meetings
 - Certification objectives (and beyond) going forward
- Adding accessibility features as per UCL policy and guidance



Recommendations

- Should use well-known and established guidelines and tools
 - FAIR-IMPACT guidelines
 - F-UJI + its upcoming extension for research software
- We would like to hear the experiences of colleagues who have gone through the CTS certification process already.
 - Build a Community of Practice (CoP): common objective obtaining the CTS



M1.8: Recommendations 2

Repository support should include generic solutions for widespread applicability and detailed, customised support for specific local or individual needs.

All support actions will provide successful applicants with financial support to enable participation in a series of virtual workshops and to carry out independent work to implement different tools, methods or approaches. Successful applicants will benefit from expert guidance and advice from FAIR-IMPACT mentors.

This open call includes four support actions relating to:

- Managing data types, schemas and vocabularies and crosswalks for FAIR researcher related metadata (in partnership with FAIRCORE4EOSC)
- · Creating EOSC compliant interoperability policies based on the EOSC Interoperability Framework (IF)
- Testing the trustworthy and FAIR-enabling repositories prototype
- · Implementation of a shared API for semantic catalogues
